



## Community Grants for safer, greener and more active travel August 2015

The Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure (DPTI), in partnership with the Motor Accident Commission recently awarded further Community Grants for safer, greener and more active travel. The successful applicants for August 2015 are:

Australian Refugee Association Safe & green	This project will support clients of the Australian Refugee Association to gain skills and confidence to use public transport, cycle safely and learn how to maintain a bike. The project will encourage clients be self-reliant and overcome transport barriers with low cost transport options.	\$11,065.00
City of Marion  Refugee and new arrival bicycle skills program	This project provides bike safety and skills training to residents who are refugees and new arrivals so they can get around their local area and further afield independently by bike.	\$8,750.00
City of Mitcham  From driving to cycling to meetings	This project will support staff at the City of Mitcham to replace car trips with riding a workplace bike to meetings and other work related destinations.	\$3,054.00
Junction Community Centre I'll meet you halfway	This project will support newly arrived refugee women in the local community to be confident walking or catching public transport to run errands and access community services. The project will provide participants with trial public transport tickets.	\$385.00
University of Adelaide	This project will provide students who are novice cyclists with the skills and bike maintenance	\$4,020.00



Cycling for fun	training, and connection with other cycling groups and community organisations for ongoing support in becoming regular bike users for trips to University and other destinations.	
Uniting Care Wesley Country SA  Safer, efficient, greener team meetings	With funds provided by the Motor Accident Commission, this project will provide video conferencing equipment in 10 locations across regional South Australia for staff members to avoid travelling long distances for face-to-face meetings. By reducing the travel by staff on country roads, there will be a reduction of risk of being involved in a crash.	\$12,338.00
Westside Housing Association Green wheels club	This project aims to increase cycling by Westside Housing tenants for short journeys and locations. Staff will use bikes for site visits to replace car trips. Tenants who are more experienced bike riders will support the less experienced to gain cycling confidence and skills.	\$1,796.00
